Almost four million children in Britain – one in three – do not own a book, a poll has found.

The National Literacy Trust charity, which carried out the survey, said the findings were very worrying because book ownership was linked to children's future success in life. Children who read well can often overcome other hurdles that lock their peers into a cycle of disadvantage, it said.

It suggests that a third (33.2%) of all children do not have books of their own.



Many children simply don't have access to books at home

There is a direct correlation between book ownership and children's reading abilities. Of the children and young people with books of their own, more than half read above the level expected for their age, with fewer than one in 10 reading below the level.

In England only one in 3 girls and only one in every 4 boys have a book of their own at home
