Amongst the groups this year were the Inner Wheel Club of Wednesbury, the Townswomens Guild, Friends of Sister Dora Hospital Fund, the Acorns Children Hospice and the Severn Hospice.

RECREATING AND PROTECTING 'THE CROFT' FOR OUR VILLAGE

The Rotary Club of Aldridge, working partnership with Aldridge Village Business Partnership and Walsall Council, was successful in obtaining a Big Lottery Community Spaces grant for improvements to The Croft.

The improvements include a new picnic area, new benches, bins and improved fencing gives better access to the children's play area and improved access for wheelchair users, particularly to seating and from nearby parking and village shopping areas. Landscaping and Signs also add character and information.

The total cost of the work was £70,000, funded by a grant from the Big Lottery Community Spaces programme, managed by Groundwork UK; Walsall Council Section 106 Regeneration funding and a grant from Aldridge & Beacon Area Partnership. Additional support has been provided by the Rotary Club of Aldridge, Aldridge Probus Club, the Aldridge Village Business Partnership, Aldridge Volunteer Gardeners and Wienerberger brick company.

The Croft improvements involved public consultation, liaison with schools, youth groups, community groups and businesses, to encourage public interest in maintaining its quality, and in continuing to bring pleasure as a public green space in our village.

Rotary Helps ORLAU

Shrewsbury Rotary Club have recently raised £600 to help the orthopaedic hospital's Orthotic Research and Locomotor Assessment Unit (ORLAU). The money has been used to help fund a new Assisting Hand Assessment (AHA) kit, which is designed to measure how effective hand and arm function is in children with cerebral palsy at The Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

The AHA kit contains a series of toys and games, which allows for fun and engaging play. Being relaxed whilst playing with toys, means that is easier to measure the patient's normal movement patterns. The money raised will also contribute to training more members of staff on how to use the AHA Kit.

President of Shrewsbury Rotary Club, Mrs Bobbie Fisher commented, "On behalf of everyone at Shrewsbury Rotary Club, we are extremely pleased that we can assist to help this forward thinking unit. My objective when I became president was to help charities which make a significant impact in Shropshire. ORLAU provides a wonderful service and we are full of admiration for the work carried out."

Present at the presentation was patient and horse rider, Rowena Bennett. Aged 16, Rowena suffers from a particular form of cerebral palsy. Dystonic cerebral palsy is a neurological condition that causes tightness and stiffness in the muscles. Rowena has been attending ORLAU for treatment for 13 years, undergoing number of а and operations continuous physiotherapy.

For the last eight years, For the last eight years, Rowena, has been an avid horse rider and has competed at a national level. She said, "Each time I come to get treated I can see an improvement, especially when I am horse riding as my posture keeps getting better. I have to be strong on the horse, so I think that helps with my physiotherapy.

Mrs Fisher added, "It was fantastic to meet a patient and see how the money raised is really going to make an impact to patient's lives.

Mr Robert Freeman, Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at RJAH added, "We would like to say a big thank you to Shrewsbury Rotary Club for their continued support, for which we are most grateful."

DONATE A TOTAL OF £2,400

Fund raising events during the past six months have enabled the Rotary Club of Wolstanton to donate a total of £2,400 to three local charities.

Top Fund-Raiser for Rotary at Ironman UK 70.3

In completing the gruelling Ironman UK 70.3 event in Exmoor in June, Richard Hill, the son of Foundation Chairman, Ivan Hill (Tettenhall Rotary Club) was the top fundraiser, raising almost £7,000 for Rotary Charity Fundraisers, which is a major benefactor from the various UK Ironman events.

The Rotary Clubs of Sherborne and Sherborne Castles have been involved with Ironman UK, Ironman arrived since in Sherborne in 2003. Over the years, they have raised over £500,000 and have become a charitable limited company. They are now, officially, 'Rotary Club of Sherborne Castles Fundraisers Limited'. Their brand name is 'Rotary Charity Fundraisers' and you can see details of their admirable activities on their website:

www.rotarycharityfundraisers.org Richard has a long history of charity fundraising, through sponsored Treks, Tri-athlons, Marathons etc., raising around £80,000 to date. This was his first "Ironman" event – effectively, a half Ironman – 1.2 miles swimming, 56 miles cycling, then running a half marathon, 13.1

miles, ie. 70.3 miles in all. To Richard's surprise, as the top fund-raiser, he was later presented and fitted out with a brand new time trials bike by one of the event's sponsors. He found this expensive and totally unexpected prize somewhat embarrassing, so he has since sent off a cheque for the bike's to Rotary value Charity Fundraisers as a personal donation to further swell Rotary coffers.

Rotary Looking at Helping Third World Businesses

A Shropshire Rotary club is looking into a scheme which could help people in the third world, from small farmers to taxi drivers, with a loan.

Microfinance, a method of helping some of the poorest people in third world countries, is under active consideration by the Rotary club of Shawbury and Mid Shropshire.

A loan under the scheme can be as small as £50, but the club has been told it will give precipitants including builders, carpenters and mechanics, the ability to start and run their own business.

The club has heard that £100 or less would allow a farmer to purchase a new type of crop to sow. Alternatively, a loan for purchasing a sewing machine for a start-up manufacturing of clothes or other goods.

Rotarian Mike Evans, a Rotary assistant governor in Shawbury and Mid Shropshire's district, told the club that microfinance was for low income people.

He said a loan could change a life, empowering women in communities to utilise profits in support of their family.

support of their family. Rotarian Mike Mortimer, chair of Shawbury and Mid Shropshire Rotary Club's international committee, said the repayment failure rate was 'very low' and most of the money was returned or re-invested by the donors.

He told the club: "From a Rotary point of view this scheme has great benefits. Firstly, a relatively small amount of money can help someone become selfsufficient.

"Secondly, it teaches people responsibility to look after the money and thirdly the money is repaid after 12 months allowing us to use the same money to help other people."

The programme is currently being run through www.lendwithcare.org – a scheme which is supported by the Co-Operative Society.
