Experience at Convention 2017 Atlanta

Conventions were something that Rotarians talk about but it exceeded all expectations. It was held in Atlanta as this was where Rotary Foundation Charity was founded 100 years ago.

From the first day everything was huge: the city, the venue, the attendees, 41,000, the programme extensive and exhilarating, the guest speakers, including Bill Gates and Jack Nicklaus, the accounts from young people telling of the experiences that had been offered and the opportunities that these had opened up to them and importantly how they saw the future of Rotary, all very inspirational and very moving.

The main convention Hall, which held over 20,000, was where I was presented with the Global award Banner, a daunting but fantastic experience,

I took part in one of the various breakout groups. Our group was on the day before the award ceremony and was entitled "Engage Rotary Alumni". There were three of us on the panel and we each had 15 minutes for our talk and then there was a general question and answer session. My two fellow speakers again were inspirational, one of them being Renan Dominguez, the very first Ambassadorial scholar and here he was at the age of 96 years telling his story!!! The other one was Clenise Platt from Norfolk Virginia who had so many accolades and an obviously bright and successful future ahead in the Rotary Family.

Needless to say the whole experience was, for me, something that I will never forget and I am so grateful to all, particularly Richard and Beverley, who worked so hard and who made it possible for me to attend this Convention.

She was proud to have been awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship in 2012 and the RI Vocational Service Leadership Award in 2013. She is a Rotary Benefactor and Paul Harris Society Member.



Having joined the District team in 2009 on the Community Service Committee, she became its chair in 2011 and served until 2016; Assistant Governor 2012 – 15; Vocational Service Chair 2014 – 2016. In addition she is an Alumni Association Member for Rotary and Rotaract with interests in Youth Service, Foundation, Club Visioning, Membership and Extension and driving forward the District Health Awareness programmes and Vocational Study Exchange.





Carol was also GSE Team Leader 2010-11 leading a team to D7030 - Eastern Caribbean, including the 3 Guiana's (Guyana, Surinam and French Guiana).

She is passionate about Rotary, allowing her to give something back to those less fortunate, whilst helping to develop and nurture others. Carol is also an Ambassador for the KIDSOUT Charity.

She moved to the West Midlands after meeting Brian on the Nile in 2000 and marrying him in 2001, where they both share Carol's passion for Rotary. Brian being a member of the Rotary Club of Aldridge. Family and Church life are important to both of them. They enjoy travelling, fellowship with friends and having fun.

Looking "Back, and to the Future" with Alumni 1210



Rotary International recently invited its Fellowships to open their Constitutions to allow Rotary Alumni and Family members to become members, to develop the Rotary experience and provide a better understanding of what Rotary embraces.

The International Caravanning Fellowship of Rotarians (ICFR) now allows these two groups to join and enjoy the company of other Rotarians whilst following their social world using caravans and motor homes.

ICFR is 50 years old this year and has over 900 members and organises about 30 meetings a year around the UK, as well as some on the continent and from time to time extended tours are organised. This year 15 couples spent March in South Africa. Our meetings are invariably for five days with the continental ones extending to two to three weeks. The UK ones are held around the country and often in areas you may not have visited before and so perhaps not aware of the local attractions. Comprehensive programmes are usually arranged but do allow for members to "do their own thing".

Our website www.rotarianscaravanning.org.uk gives a great deal of information on our activities and looking at its "News & Views" (its biannual magazine) link provides a comprehensive insight as to who we are and what we do.

Membership does come with a warning. Fun, Friendship and Fellowship are compulsory. With membership costing £10 a year, where else could you get such value for money?
