Rotarian Cormac Doyle, VSE team leader, along with team members, Maddie Whiting, Nicola Davies and Adam Ellis recently represented District 1210 in a Vocation Study Exchange (VSE) Project to Bangalore, India. They departed on February 2nd for a two week stay.

On their return home they presented aspects of their recent trip at a Rotary Home Coming Dinner held at Linden House in Wolverhampton. During the evening of 13th March Adam and Maddie explained that they were very well looked after by local Rotarians. They visited factories with a technological gamut from 'welding in flip-flops' to 'lathes the size of this room'. The cultural aspect of their two week visit was not neglected as several colour slides of temples, pilgrimage sites and a wedding attested. Nicola works at Harper Adams College. Adam and Maddie work at the Royal Air Force Museum Cosford and explained that their three year apprenticeship at Cosford (combined with college courses) involves them in aircraft restoration activity with transferable skills for their later careers. Maddie, Adam, Cormac (and the absent Nicola) were presented with their Rotary Alumni Badges and Rotary Alumni 1210 membership cards.

To help you on your way, Rotary across the country is setting up a few check and photo points at places of interest where you can have a break, get your logbook stamped as proof of passage or take a selfie near a landmark. You will have the opportunity to meet other travellers. You can drive as near or as far as you wish and there is no requirement to drive for all four days. Polio and Rotary

Poliomyelitis (polio) is a paralyzing and potentially fatal disease. The poliovirus invades the nervous system and can cause total paralysis in a matter of hours. It can strike at any age but mainly affects children under five. Polio is incurable, but completely vaccine-preventable.

In the early 20th century, polio was one of the most feared diseases in industrialized countries, paralysing hundreds of thousands of children every year. Soon after the introduction of effective vaccines in the 1950s and 1960s however, polio was brought under control and practically eliminated as a public health problem in these countries.

It took somewhat longer for polio to be recognized as a major problem in developing countries. Lameness surveys during the 1970s revealed that the disease was also prevalent in developing countries.

PolioPlus

In 1985, Rotary launched its PolioPlus program, the first initiative to tackle global polio eradication through the mass vaccination of children. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.7 billion and countless volunteer hours to immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. In addition, Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by donor governments to contribute more than \$7.2 billion to the effort.

Global Polio Eradication Initiative

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative, formed in 1988, is a public-private partnership that includes Rotary, the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and governments of the world. Rotary's focus is advocacy, fundraising, volunteer recruitment and awareness building.

Polio Today

Today, there are only three countries that have never stopped transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Just 37 polio cases were confirmed worldwide in 2016, which is a reduction of more than 99.9 percent since the 1980s, when the world saw about 1,000 cases per day.

Challenges

The polio cases represented by the remaining one percent are the most difficult to prevent, due to factors including geographical isolation, poor public infrastructure, armed conflict and cultural barriers. Until polio is eradicated, all countries remain at risk of outbreaks.

Ensuring Success

Rotary will raise \$50 million per year over the next three years, with every dollar to be matched with two additional dollars from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. These funds help to provide much-needed operational support, medical personnel, laboratory equipment, and educational materials for health workers and parents. Governments, corporations and private individuals all play a crucial role in funding.

Rotary in Action

More than one million Rotary members have donated their time and personal resources to end polio. Every year, hundreds of Rotary members work side-by-side with Health Workers to vaccinate children in polio-affected countries.
