Information Pack for 2024 – 2025

THEME: - 'Carbon Reduction and/or Minimising Waste'

Introduction

The Rotary Young Environmentalist Competition is organised and promoted by Rotary District 1210

Aims and Objectives

The competition aims to encourage young people to:

- interact with the environment
- address serious environmental issues
- develop and explore solutions to the issues
- explore, investigate, research and undertake an environmental sustainability project

Who can take part?

The competition is open to all schools and college communities, those who are home educated, long with any other young peoples' community organisations, for example, community Rotakids, community Interact, Community Groups, Scout Groups, Girl Guides, Church Groups, Youth Organisations etc.

The three age groups are:

Junior 7 up to and including 10 years old

Intermediate 11 to 13 years old Senior 14 to 17 years old

Entrants must not be over the upper age parameter for each group on 31st August 2024.

With the age qualifying date of 31st August 2024, it should be noted that some junior entrants may be 11, intermediate entrants may be 14 and some senior entrants may be 18 at the time of some or all the stage competitions e.g., a competitor who may be 17 on 31st August but turns 18 on 1st September is allowed to enter. **Competitors must include their age on the application form.**

Entrants should normally enter the competition organised by a local Rotary club

Entries can be either as an individual or of a team of up to four people.



The Two Stages of the Competition

Local Heats

These are organised by local Rotary clubs with the winning entries in each age group entered into the district competition.

District Finals

These are organised by the Rotary district for the winners of the local heats for each age group in each category.

Deadline dates for both local heats and District Finals will be determined by the district. Entrants should check dates with their local Rotary club in the first instance. Any entries submitted after agreed local deadlines will not be accepted.

Competition Guidelines

Purpose

To engage young people to interact with the environment, address serious issues and develop and explore solutions to the problems.

Objectives

To encourage young people to explore, investigate, research and undertake an environmental sustainability project during 2024-2025 on the theme "Carbon Reduction and/or Minimising Waste"

The project undertaken should raise awareness to a particular problem within the given topic area and inspire action to respond to the growing awareness of the problem.

Task

Select a topic within the theme and undertake some research and exploration into the current magnitude of the issues associated with the theme of the competition. They may work on projects on their own or as part of a group.

They should decide and develop their own ideas while undertaking the project and offering solutions.

Possible projects could be approached from different angles and perspectives and might include one or more topics such as those listed below.

- Disposal of materials that could be re-purposed.
- The impact of leaving lights or equipment switched on or leaving a stationary car engine running.
- Is weather a factor in producing waste?
- The cost (monetary and environmental) of packaging food rather than buying it loose.
- Is it environmentally better to have goods delivered rather than going to a shop?
- Unnecessary waste is not only material, it might also be wasted opportunity, wasted effort or wasted time.
- Single use plastics are they necessary and how easy are they to recycle?
- How do pupils travel to your school?

These are just some ideas and young people are also encouraged to develop their own projects within the theme.

Students in the older age group are encouraged to explore and develop new concepts other than those regularly reported in the popular press.



Outcomes

Young people should engage with the Environment and identify current issues.

Projects should be eye catching, present a balanced viewpoint exhibiting understanding of the environmental problem, and showcase a solution or suggest an innovative new idea for solving the environmental issue.

Presentation

Entrants can choose the format the project is to be presented in. These might include one or more of the following:

- Written and illustrated submissions
- Photographic or artistic presentations
- Audio or video reports (because of space limitations for email, it is likely to be preferable to provide a YouTube Link for videos and related presentations).
- A tangible product such as an App for smart phone
- Interactive conversations or creative movement

Written reports should be well illustrated and be no more than 1000 words long.

Poster displays should be A3 or A4 in size in colour or black and white with images and text.

Audio or Video presentations should not exceed 5 minutes for individual presentations or 10 minutes for group presentations.

Please Note: Projects which incorporate photographic images of people under 18 years or vulnerable adults must be accompanied by consent forms for the use of those photographic images.

Judging Criteria

Evidence, Research and Effectiveness

The project must demonstrate that exploration and some research has been undertaken. The aims of the project must clearly be stated, and outcomes must be capable of assessment and demonstrate sustainability.

Innovation and Adaptability

New concepts and ideas are valuable and will be recognized and the project should be capable of replication by others based on the information provided.

Beneficiaries and what lessons have been learnt

What would the benefit of the project be to the community or society as a whole? Is it likely to be cost effective and what problems, if any, have been encountered? How could such a project be improved in future?

Presentation

How much information has been given? Is it imaginative and eye catching? What is the impact? Is it easy to follow and understand? What is the quality of the content?

Evidence of Teamwork

If undertaken in a group what is the evidence of participation of individual members in the team?

Plagiarism or Close Copied Images

Plagiarised or 'close-copied' images are not permitted in any competition. It is important that we protect the work of creative individuals. Whilst we are all inspired by the work of others, there is without doubt a grey area where inspiration carries over to close copying. For our competitions 'close copying' is where, to a reasonable person, the submitted entry appears remarkably similar in significant important respects to a body of work created elsewhere. We are looking for original pieces, not copies, which match the theme of the competition.

Recognition

At all stages of the competition, competitors will receive a certificate of participation

How to enter



Entries should be made through your local Rotary club which can be found by using the club finder facility in the top left-hand corner of the Home Page of the Rotary GB&I website www.rotarygbi.org. In case of difficulty please contact Geoff Cooper email: geoffcooper29@gmail.com

Entrants need to complete an entry form, available from their local Rotary club and submit it along with their project, to the local organizer by the agreed deadline. It is essential that the name of the competitor or team of competitors and their project is clearly linked with the right entry form and any necessary consent forms for photographic images used if applicable.

All entries should be submitted electronically.

<u>IMPORTANT RESTRICTION TO NOTE</u>: Please note that entries and supporting information sent electronically **MUST NOT EXCEED 15Mb per email sent**. This is likely to apply to Videos, and a suggested method for submission is to generate a YouTube Video and forward the link in a covering email. Alternative options are to send the nomination and supporting information across as several emails.

Rotary Youth Competitions and other opportunities for young people

The Young Environmentalist Competition is one of a number of competitions for young people organised by Rotary GB&I. The others are: Young Artist; Young Chef; Youth Speaks: A Debate; Young Musician; Young Photographer; and Young Writer. There are also annual Rotary Young Citizen Awards, a number of clubs organise Technology Tournaments and there are several Rotary specific programmes including RotaKids, Interact, Developing Future Leaders and more. Working with Children

Rotary GB&I has adopted this statement of policy in working with children, vulnerable adults and those with disability:

The needs and rights of the child, the elderly, the vulnerable and those with disability take priority. It is the duty of every Rotarian to safeguard to the best of their ability, the welfare of and prevent the physical, sexual or emotional abuse and neglect of all children, the elderly, persons with disability or otherwise vulnerable persons with whom they come into contact during their Rotarian duties.
